1. Residential Dock Reconfigurations at 20 Beacon Bay (Beacon Bay Homeowner Association Dock Systems)

Beacon Bay Homeowner Association ("Applicant") has applied for a harbor development permit to remove and replace the floats and one gangway on the four homeowner association dock systems ("Project"). Three proposed floats extend beyond the specified limits by 4-feet which is the same distance as the existing floats extend. The proposed Work Dock float extends beyond the specified limits by 1-foot. Because the Applicant is proposing to construct bayward beyond the specified limits defined in Newport Beach Municipal Code ("NBMC") 17.35.030(A), staff is unable to approve the project. Therefore, NBMC directs the Harbor Commission to hold a public hearing for the proposed project.

6. PRESENTATION

1. City of Newport Beach Water Quality Program Overview

Senior Engineer John Kappeler provided an overview report on the City's Water Quality Program. Topics presented included the involvement of regional cities and entities in water quality issues, water quality program monitoring cost sharing agreements, Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) programs as related to the regulations which govern the various limits of elements in the water, the costs of water sampling, the noticing process required if limits are exceeded, projects instituted by the City to get rid of bacteria and trash in targeted locations, the success of diversion projects and associated grants, the success of the particle separator project facilitated by Mr. Hylkema which keeps items out of the vessel pump outs which can cause damage, and the State grant which pays 75% of the cost.

Mr. Kappeler continued his presentation providing an overview of the Bay and ocean water weekly testing at 35 stations, related public noticing and historical data, new proposed State rules concerning dissolved copper in the Bay, the City's difference of opinion and investment into challenging components of the proposed copper regulation, State mandates concerning compliance with trash collecting devices and the City's historic proactive stance on placement of such devices, the installation of trash skimmers around the Bay, the cost of which is 75% covered by a grant, the success of the debris booms and related grant funding, successful partnerships with surrounding agencies on a \$9 million trash collection device that also incorporates a storm water to sewer diversion, the upcoming September deployment of the Newport Bay trash inceptor and related grant funding, mitigation measures required by the Coastal Commission, and underwater clean ups hosted by the City in collaboration with various community partners.

Commission and staff discussion ensued including comments related to clarification of dry weather runoff, copper testing in the water, the schedule for TMDL testing and partnership with various agencies, implementation schedule for the Water Wheel project and its intersection with the boom, clarification concerning the removal of the bacteria postings in light of launch of the diversion (approximately 2006 through 2008), weight specifications and inspections for the moorings, clarification of mandates versus TMDL's, locations for testing, impacts of first flushes at the beginning of the wet season, determination of the sources of copper in the water, clarification of the amount of grant funds the City has obtained for water quality projects and programs (approximately \$50 million), opportunities to obtain or secure grant funds, the potential impact of dredging, the potential negative impacts of the City acting as a regulatory body on certain water quality matters, and the process and costs for undergrounding certain trash collection devices.

Chair Scully opened public comments.

Adam Leverenz thanked staff for the presentation, expressed his mutual concern regarding the impacts of trash and litter, and inquired if the Harbor Commission could institute a public education campaign encouraging clean up. Additionally, he opined concerning the source of copper as related to recent measurements.

George Hylkema thanked staff for the presentation and recognition of the value of the particle separator. He appreciated the collaboration and update on the project.

Seeing no others, Chair Scully closed public comments.

General Plan Vision Statement Ad Hoc - Commissioners Scully and Marston (08-09-2023)

Report noted that Mr. Jim Mosher had suggested the Ad Hoc Committee engage with the consultants related to role of the Harbor Commission concerning to the General Plan update. Additionally, based upon Ad Hoc member's attendance at the recent General Plan Advisory Committee meeting, it was confirmed the Harbor Commission should be involved in the process, particularly as related to the Harbor & Bay Element.

Public Dock Utilization Ad Hoc - Commissioners Beer, Svrcek, and Williams (04-10-2024)

Report noted meetings were held with two different private parties concerning providing access to offshore moorings and transportation around the harbor to key locations. City staff has been informed and there are related legal items that are currently under review. There are challenges to a test pilot project as a MAP is required to drop off or pick up individuals on public piers or floats.

Chair Scully opened public comments. Seeing no others, Chair Scully closed public comments.

There was no further action taken on this item and it was received and filed unanimously.

Balboa Ferry Ad Hoc - Commissioners Scully, Svrcek and Yahn (05-10-2023)

Report noted Chair Scully reported that Joe Beek is working diligently on grant opportunities, including being close to securing \$8.9 million grant with the South Coast Air Quality Management District. However,

they may be delays at the State level and concerns with the funding being available in light of the State's budget deficit. As related to bringing higher levels of electricity to the ferry, staff has been working on the matter and there will be significant interaction with Southern California Edison related to power capacity and connectivity.

General Plan Vision Statement Ad Hoc – Commissioners Scully and Marston (08-09-2023)

Report noted Chair Scully reported that Mr. Jim Mosher had suggested the Ad Hoc Committee engage with the consultants and members of the Harbor and Beach Element Committee related to role of the Harbor Commission concerning to the General Plan update. Additionally, based upon Ad Hoc member's attendance at the recent General Plan Advisory Committee meeting, it was confirmed the Harbor Commission should be involved in the process, particularly as related to the Harbor & Bay-Beach Element.

TITLE: Residential Dock Reconfigurations at 20 Beacon Bay (Beacon Bay

Homeowner Association Dock Systems)

ABSTRACT:

Beacon Bay Homeowner Association ("Applicant") has applied for a harbor development permit to remove and replace the floats and one gangway on the four homeowner association dock systems ("Project"). Three proposed floats extend beyond the specified limits by 4-feet which is the same distance as the existing floats extend. The proposed Work Dock float extends beyond the specified limits by 1-foot. Because the Applicant is proposing to construct bayward beyond the specified limits defined in Newport Beach Municipal Code ("NBMC") 17.35.030(A), staff is unable to approve the project. Therefore, NBMC directs the Harbor Commission to hold a public hearing for the proposed project.

RECOMMENDATION:

- a) Conduct a public hearing;
- b) Find the Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) and Section 15302 (Replacement or Reconstruction) of the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Division 6, Chapter 3; and
- c) Adopt Resolution HC2024-02 approving in concept the Project.

FUNDING REQUIREMENTS:

There is no fiscal impact related to this item.

DISCUSSION:

Section 17.35.030(A) of the Newport Beach Municipal Code (NBMC) states that piers and floats may not extend bayward beyond the specified limits without approval of the Harbor Commission pursuant to subsection (G)(1). The specified extension limits within this subsection vary within the harbor depending on the project's location. The Harbor Commission may approve or conditionally

approve the bayward extension of piers and floats, and their decision shall be on a case-by-case basis.

The aerials (Attachment A) depict the four separate dock systems along the Beacon Bay property, adjacent to the D-Mooring field.

The Applicant proposes to remove and replace four floats and one gangway at the Property. NBMC allows floats to extend 16-feet bayward of the Pierhead Line at this location as depicted on Attachment B (blue shaded area). The Applicant is proposing to extend beyond this specified limit to the Project Line.

There are no other residential docks in this vicinity. The Balboa Yacht Basin marina floats to the east also extend to the Project Line which is consistent with the Applicant's request.

EXISTING DOCK CONFIGURATIONS

Attachment C depicts the existing approved dock configurations for each of the four systems. City approvals from 2003, 1996 and 1971 each depict the dock systems extending to the Project Line.

The Work Dock on the east of the property currently extends 11-feet beyond the pierhead line which is well within the specified limit (16-foot bayward beyond the Pierhead Line). Note the previous approvals depict the Work Float extending to the Project Line, yet it was not built per the approved plans for unknown reasons.

The remaining three floats extend to the Project Line as previously permitted by the City in Exhibit C. The Project Line does not appear to be exactly parallel to the natural contours of the beach which explains the negligible inconsistency of the existing floats relative to the Project Line.

PROPOSED PROJECT

The Work Dock on the east of the property is proposed to extend 1-foot beyond the specified limits (i.e. 17-feet beyond the Pierhead Line vs. the specified limits of 16-feet.) The gangway will also be replaced to both account for the float positioned further bayward and to bring the gangway length into compliance.

The remaining three floats will be replaced in generally the same configuration to accommodate the same number of boats. However, the double-wide slips at each float will increase in width by approximately 2-feet, 6-inches to better accommodate the modern electric boat beam. The piles at each float will be replaced to accommodate the increased float width. No work is proposed on the gangways and piers.

REQUIRED FINDINGS:

The Harbor Commission shall hold a public hearing and shall make the following findings as specified in NBMC 17.30.030(G)(1). The Harbor Commission's decision shall be on a case-by-case basis and prior approvals shall not have any precedential value.

a. Special circumstances applicable to the subject property exist, such as location, shape, size, surrounding topography or other physical features.

- b. Because of those special circumstances, strict compliance with the specified criteria would deny the property of privileges enjoyed by other properties in the vicinity.
- c. The bayward extension will not provide the subject property with special privileges inconsistent with limitations on properties in the vicinity.
- d. There will be no negative impacts to adjacent property owners, harbor views, navigation or future dredging.

The Project conforms to the Harbor Design Criteria. The proposed dock systems depicted in Attachment D are generally the same as existing and accommodate the same number of boats. A longer code-compliant gangway will be installed at the Work Dock.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

The Harbor Commission may approve or conditionally approve a harbor development permit and/or approval in concept for a pier or float to extend bayward beyond the specified limits upon making all the findings in NBMC.

Staff recommends approval in concept of the Project because all the findings in NBMC can be made. Attachment F is the draft Resolution HC2024-02 which includes the specified findings along with project special conditions.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

Staff recommends the Harbor Commission find this Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) and Section 15302 (Replacement or Reconstruction) of the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Division 6, Chapter 3. CEQA Guidelines Section 15301 (Class 1) applies to the "operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of existing or former use." Section 15302 (Class 2) applies to the "replacement or reconstruction of existing structures and facilities where the new structures will be located on the same site as the structure replaced and will have substantially the same purpose and capacity as the structure replaced[.]" The replacement residential dock systems are in the same location and are substantially the same size and purpose as the dock systems they replace. The overwater coverage of the new dock systems is substantially the same as the existing dock systems (5,947 square feet compared to 5,526 square feet).

NOTICING:

The agenda item has been noticed according to the Brown Act (72 hours in advance of the meeting at which the Harbor Commission considers the item). This public hearing was noticed to all residents within a 300' radius per NBMC Section 17.05.140(B) and the subject dock was posted. The notice was also published in the newspaper on Saturday, June 22, 2024 (Attachment E).



A RESOLUTION OF THE HARBOR COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH, CALIFORNIA APPROVING IN CONCEPT A DOCK RECONFIGURATION AT 20 BEACON BAY

THE HARBOR COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH HEREBY FINDS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. STATEMENT OF FACTS.

- 1. The owner of the property at 20 Beacon Bay ("Property") has applied for a harbor development permit to remove and replace the four dock floats and one gangway of the Beacon Bay Homeowner Association floats ("Project"), as more specifically described and depicted in the Staff Report and its attachments. With the reconfigurations, the dock systems will continue to extend beyond the specified limits.
- 2. Section 17.35.030(A) of the Newport Beach Municipal Code (NBMC) prohibits piers and floats from extending beyond the specified limits without the approval of the Harbor Commission pursuant to subsection (G)(1).
- 3. A public hearing was held on July 10, 2024 at the Council Chambers at 100 Civic Center Drive, Newport Beach. A notice of time, place and purpose of the hearing was given in accordance with California Government Code Section 54950 *et seq.* ("Ralph M. Brown Act") and NBMC Section 17.05.140(B). Evidence, both written and oral, was presented to, and considered by, the Harbor Commission at this hearing.

SECTION 2. CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT DETERMINATION.

1. This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) and Section 15302 (Replacement or Reconstruction) of the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Division 6, Chapter 3 (CEQA Guidelines) because it has no potential to have a significant effect on the environment. The replacement dock systems are in the same location and are substantially the same size and purpose as the dock systems they replace. The overwater coverage of the new dock systems is substantially the same as the existing dock systems.

SECTION 3. REQUIRED FINDINGS.

The Harbor Commission hereby adopts the following findings:

1. NBMC section 17.35.030(G)(1)(a). Special circumstances applicable to the subject property exist, such as location, shape, size, surrounding topography or other physical features.

Facts in Support of Findings: The Beacon Bay Homeowner Association community docks are located along a beach where no other residential docks exist. The City's Balboa Yacht Basin marina is immediately adjacent to the east of the Property and those floats extend to the Project Line. The replacement floats are substantially similar to the existing floats which have extended to the Project Line for over 50 years except for the Work Dock which had been constructed landward of the Project Line yet previously approved to the Project Line. The replacement floats accommodate the same number of vessels as the existing floats accommodate.

Additionally, the three main dock systems are orientated so that the slips are accessed via the landward side of the float therefore minimizing impacts channelward. Because of the proximity to the shoreline, relocating the floats landward to the specified limit would significantly hamper or eliminate access during most tide cycles.

2. NBMC section 17.35.030(G)(1)(b). Because of those special circumstances, strict compliance with the specified criteria would deny the property of privileges enjoyed by other properties in the vicinity.

Facts in Support of Findings: The replacement three main dock systems extend the same distance bayward to the Project Line as the existing, approved systems extend. Immediately east of the Property are the City's Balboa Yacht Basin marina floats which also extend to the Project Line. Allowing the Property's replacement floats to extend to the Project Line is consistent with the privileges other properties enjoy in the vicinity.

Additionally, the three main dock systems are orientated so that the slips are accessed via the landward side of the float therefore minimizing impacts channelward. Because of the proximity to the shoreline, relocating the floats landward to the specified limit would significantly hamper or eliminate access during most tide cycles. This would deny the Property the privilege of adequate slip access enjoyed by others in the vicinity.

3. NBMC section 17.35.030(G)(1)(c). The bayward extension will not provide the subject property with special privileges inconsistent with limitations on properties in the vicinity.

Facts in Support of Findings: The replacement three main dock systems extend the same distance bayward to the Project Line as the existing, approved systems extend. Immediately east of the Property are the City's Balboa Yacht Basin marina floats which also extend to the Project Line. Allowing the Property's replacement floats to extend to the Project Line is consistent with other properties in the vicinity and would not provide a special privilege.

4. NBMC section 17.35.030(G)(1)(d). There will be no negative impacts to adjacent property owners, harbor views, navigation, or future dredging.

Facts in Support of Findings: The replacement three main dock systems extend the same distance bayward to the Project Line as the existing, approved systems extend. Immediately east of the Property are the City's Balboa Yacht Basin marina floats which also extend to the Project Line as do the other floats eastward to the Balboa Island Bridge. There

will be no negative impacts to the adjacent property owners, harbor views, navigation or future dredging.

SECTION 4. DECISION.

Project: Reconfiguration of Four Homeowner Association Dock Systems

Address: 20 Beacon Bay

The approval in concept of the subject project at the above referenced address, to reconfigure the four dock systems in a similar configuration by removing and replacing the four floats, and removing and replacing a gangway, is subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The above referenced project and structure(s) is subject to all applicable federal, state, county and City of Newport Beach statutes, rules, ordinances, laws, and regulations, including but not limited to Title 17 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code.
- 2. Any future work on the above-mentioned structure(s) beyond that which is expressly permitted herein may require permits from the City of Newport Beach and any other applicable agencies. Painting and work considered to be cosmetic in nature does not require a permit. This approval does not extend to any changes to the operational characteristics, structures, and project beyond those expressly included as part of this approval.
- The conditions set forth in this document pertain to the project as approved in concept.
 Any future modifications or alterations may require additional and/or updated conditions
 which may override or change these conditions. These conditions supersede all past
 conditions associated with this property.
- 4. Only marine oriented uses are allowed on the pier, pier platform, gangway, and float. Patio furniture, plants etc. are not permitted.
- 5. In accordance with subsections A and B.3 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code section 10.08.030 (Use of Streets and Sidewalks for Commercial Purposes), as amended from time to time or any other successor statutes thereto, the project applicant shall obtain the proper permits for equipment and materials storage.

- 6. The project shall be implemented in conformance with the current version of the City of Newport Beach Local Coastal Program Coastal Land Use Plan.
- The noise regulations in Newport Beach Municipal Code Section 10.28.040 (Construction Activity – Noise Regulations), as amended from time to time or any other successor statute thereto, apply.
- 8. Vessels shall not extend bayward beyond the east and west ends of each float by a distance of more than the maximum width of the beam.
- 9. Vessels may not extend beyond the prolongation of the east property line.
- 10. All required insurance shall be maintained in full force and effect during the pendency of this approval in concept.
- 11. To the fullest extent permitted by law, applicant shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its City Council, its boards and commissions, officials, officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all claims, demands, obligations, damages, actions, causes of action, suits, losses, judgments, fines, penalties, liabilities, costs and expenses (including without limitation, attorney's fees, disbursements and court costs) of every kind and nature whatsoever which may arise from or in any manner relate (directly or indirectly) to City's Approval in Concept, the applicant's exercise of this Approval in Concept, the activities of the applicant carried on under authority of this Approval in Concept, and/or any related California Environmental Quality Act determinations. This indemnification shall include, but not be limited to, damages awarded against the City if any, costs of suit, attorney's fees, and other expenses incurred in connection with such claim, action, causes of action, suit or proceeding whether incurred by applicant, City, and/or the parties initiating or bringing such proceeding. The applicant shall indemnify City for all of City's costs, attorney's fees, and damages which City incurs in enforcing the indemnification provisions set forth in this condition. The applicant shall pay to the City upon demand any amount owed to the City pursuant to the indemnification requirements prescribed in this condition.

Newport Harbor Commission Purpose & Charter

Newport Harbor supports numerous recreational and commercial activities, waterfront residential communities and scenic and biological resources. The Harbor Commission's charge under Section 713 of the Newport Beach City Charter is to advise the City Council on the diverse uses of Newport Harbor and its waterfront. The Charter specifies:

There shall be a City Harbor Commission of seven members which shall have the power and duty to:

- (a) Advise the City Council on all matters relating to proposed harbor improvements and the use of Newport Harbor.
- (b) Advise the City Council on all matters pertaining to the use, control, operation, promotion, and regulation of all vessels within Newport Harbor.
- (c) Approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove applications on all permits where the City of Newport Beach Municipal Code assigns the authority for the decision to the Harbor Commission.
- (d) Make recommendations to the City Council for the adoption of regulations and programs necessary for the ongoing implementation of the goals, objectives, and policies of the Harbor and Bay Element of the General Plan.
- (e) Advise the City Council, Planning Commission and City Manager on land use and property development applications referred to the Harbor Commission by the City Council, Planning Commission, or the City Manager.
- (f) Serve as an appellate and reviewing body for decisions on permits and other harborrelated administrative matters where the City of Newport Beach Municipal Code assigns such authority to the Harbor Commission.
- (g) Perform such other duties relating to Newport Harbor as the City Council may require. (As amended effective December 14, 2020)

Harbor Commission – Objectives

The following objectives are intended to support the mission of the Harbor Area Management Plan and the two most essential responsibilities of the Harbor Commission: (1) Ensuring the long-term welfare of Newport Harbor for all residential, recreational, and commercial users; (2) Promoting Newport Harbor as a preferred and welcoming destination for visitors and residents alike.

These updated objectives are subject to the review and approval of the Commission, and final approval by the Newport Beach City Council. Harbor Commission ad hoc committees, as established by the Commission, bear principal responsibility for coordinating the Commission's efforts, along with staff support, in achieving these Objectives.

2024 Newport Beach Harbor Commission Goals and Assignments

- 1. Conduct annual review of Title 17 and recommend updates to City Council where necessary (Commissioner Yahn).
- 2. Collaborate with the Water Quality/Coastal Tidelands Committee to partner on areas within the Harbor that both Commission/Committees intersect (Commissioners: Svrcek, Scully)
- 3. Successful implementation of the mooring reconfiguration initiative, including design, testing, permitting, execution, and monitoring (Commissioner: Beer).
- 4. Collaborate with Parks, Beaches, and Recreation Commission and Staff to evaluate the best use for Lower Castaway and make a recommendation to City Council (Commissioners: Marston, Svrcek).
- 5. Work with staff to identify opportunities to add additional Harbor Services (Restrooms, additional pump out stations, dock space, Shore Boat Service, Boat Launch Ramp, and development of the mobile app) (Commissioners: Marston, Yahn)

TITLE: Harbormaster Update – June 2024 Activities

ABSTRACT:

The Harbormaster oversees the City Harbor Department and is responsible for the management of the City's mooring fields, enforcement of the municipal code, events permitting, safety and rescue operations, the Marina Park Guest Marina, marine sanitation pump out equipment and public pier maintenance, impound and disposition of abandoned and unclaimed vessels and public relations and information dissemination on and about Newport Harbor.

This report will update the Harbor Commission on the Harbor Department's recent activities.

RECOMMENDATION:

- a) Determine this action is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Sections 15060(c)(2) and 15060(c)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines because this action will not result in a physical change to the environment, directly or indirectly; and
- b) Receive and file.

FUNDING REQUIREMENTS:

There is no fiscal impact related to this item.

DISCUSSION:

Preparation for the busy summer season was the focus of activities for the Harbor Department in June. Details on the delivery of some services in support of our mission are summarized below.

Clean

Significant efforts were expended to maintain and improve the cleanliness of the harbor. Highlights included:

- A dinghy at a public dock was observed discharging into the harbor. Alert Harbor Service Workers (HSW) boomed off the dinghy and absorbed the discharge
- Based on a public comment at a Harbor Commission meeting, we connected with Public Works on their "Clean Up" program initiated several years ago and mainly focused on the ocean beaches. In the future, they will incorporate harbor beach cleanups into their lineup. It is also worthy of note that there are active programs to remove debris from the surface of the harbor (Tim Smith's private skimmer, HD patrol boats equipped with skimmers (see Stats) and automated rovers coming to the harbor before the end of the year) plus a pilot program to remove large debris from the bottom of the bay using both divers to mark the material and cranes/davits to lift and remove
- The Marine Flare Disposal event was not as well attended as hoped (70+ cars) but no one had to wait and a significant amount of material was collected
- In a related story, the Marine Flare Producer Responsibility Act passed the State Senate 34-0. The State Assembly will consider the bill soon. The Governor would have to sign to become law
- A tire found floating in the coves was removed and disposed of properly
- A visiting vessel well-known to the Harbor team enjoyed an extended stay in the harbor. We suspect they illegally enjoyed a couple of nights on a public dock. We were unable to collect evidence that they were overstaying the time limit. HSWs gave them information on harbor rules, public docks, and the anchorage
- The team put significant effort into dock and facility maintenance at Marina Park.
 Trash receptacles and the entire Marina including gangway, piling caps, dock boxes and pedestals were prepared for the expected heavy use

Safe

Significant efforts were expended to maintain and improve the safety of the harbor. Highlights included:

- Several instances of speeding were observed, addressed, and resolved
- Several instances of bow and stern riding were observed and corrected
- Swimmers jumping off a moving electric vessel were contacted and educated about safe boating practices
- A local woman known to the Department attempted to board a boat in the marina at Marina Park, slipped, and went into the water. HSWs quickly retrieved her from the water and provided first aid to some abrasions and swelling. NBFD was called they arrived quickly and confirmed the application of first aid. She was escorted home by NBPD
- HSWs on patrol were approached by a federal agency operating on the water.
 They asked if they could practice maneuvering alongside our vessel as part of their
 training. We were pleased to collaborate with them on their training. They
 expressed their gratitude and indicated they look forward to collaborating with us
 in the future
- The anchorage boundary buoy positions were confirmed with a little charting and navigation exercise. In the near future the east anchorage buoys will be replaced

to make them consistent with the west anchorage buoys and distinguish them from the racing marks

- Several mooring assists were provided including one that involved contact between the mooring permittee requesting service and the vessel on the next mooring. Follow-up with both permittees was conducted. Unskilled mariners can have trouble in any conditions including the current mooring layout. Mariners are advised to assess their skills and capabilities given current conditions and ask for assistance BEFORE they get into trouble
- Observers may well have mistaken an incident at Marina Park for a remake of the Hitchcock film, "The Birds". Staff and marina customers were attacked by fowl associated with an impounded vessel. Hitchcock made the original film in 1963 to convey his concerns regarding humanity's failure to appreciate and protect nature
- Discussions and techniques for gaining compliance with advisements on speed and wake were carried out
- Several instances of improper anchoring were addressed including education on proper tackle and techniques
- Solar-powered, US Coast Guard-approved lights were installed on various Private
 Aids to Navigation throughout the harbor. More lights will be installed by the end
 of July. Funds to purchase the lights were provided by the Newport Harbor
 Foundation via a grant
- Two wave runners speeding in the harbor were stopped and educated. Others who did not stop were cited
- HSWs provided first aid to another Marina Park customer
- A report of two missing children on a paddleboard was received at the end of the watch. A survey of HSWs coming off the water indicated the paddlers in question had been seen near Marina Par. A quick transit back out on the harbor resulted in an escort for the paddlers back to their parents anxiously awaiting their arrival
- At the invitation of the US Coast Guard, HSWs participated in training with the cutter "Narwhal" and tender "Narwhal 1" in the ocean
- Several disabled boats were assisted back to safety
- A sub-permittee/guest who lost reverse was assisted onto his mooring. Another sub-permittee was assisted off a different mooring at his departure
- An expensive camera was left on the Washington St. public dock. An investigation led to the discovery that the equipment belonged to a commercial charter operator. Upon contact and proof of ownership, the equipment was returned

Well-enjoyed

Significant efforts were expended to maintain and improve the enjoyment of the harbor. Highlights included:

- The Dockmaster assisted a babysitter with kids visiting Marina Park in locating a lost pair of keys
- HSWs took the initiative to hire a diver to search for a pair of glasses lost by a
 mooring permittee when he fell off the dock after a recent surgery. Once retrieved,
 in an act of service well "above and beyond", the glasses were delivered personally
 to the permittee in San Clemente by HSW Lebano

- A vessel exceeding noise limits was advised and complied
- An unpermitted electric vessel charter was observed using the Balboa Marina public dock to drop off guests. The registered owner of the vessel was identified and notified of various violations
- A recognizable commercial charter vessel was observed (and documented) loading and unloading passengers at the 15th St. public dock. The operators of the charter vessel were notified of this violation and restrictions on the use of public docks
- An argument between a boater and fisherman on the M Street public dock was settled by HSWs
- The Mayor was taken on harbor tour, along with the youth winner of "Mayor for the Day" and her family. The tour focused on code enforcement, water quality and recent improvements to the water quality and methods for measuring in the harbor
- Several calls were received about excessive noise and material discharge from a large vessel in the Lido Marina Village marina. HSWs responded, advised the crew working on the boat, and forwarded documentation which resulted in a citation
- A rental electric vessel enjoyed an unoccupied mooring and a break from their excursion. Day use of unoccupied moorings is permissible for private and chartered vessels

Odds and Ends

Significant efforts were expended to address harbor-related matters other than cleanliness, safety, and enjoyment. Highlights included:

- In collaboration with Animal Control the Dockmaster captured a pelican on the dock at Marina Park and sent it to rehab. The capture was very impressive and the outcome was a success for the bird
- The Department has officially switched radio operations from VHF 19A to 17.
 Multiple daily announcements on channel VHF 19A are being made
- A vessel collision witnessed by HSWs was documented and communicated to the registered owners of both vessels and the OC Sheriffs Harbor Patrol. The vessel owner not on scene was very grateful for the contact and documentation
- Our application to the California Coastal Commission for the C Mooring Field optimization was accepted (deemed complete) on June 19 after honoring some last-minute graphics requests
- A film crew spent a day with HSWs obtaining footage/video for what will become
 a three-minute video on safety in Newport Harbor. We were grateful for some
 collaboration with our colleagues in the City Recreation Sailing program and a
 small vessel rental operation (Balboa Water Sports). They provided subjects and
 material to include in the video. A safety video that rental concessions can show
 their customers and anyone will be able to access from the Harbor Department
 website should be coming soon
- The registered owner of a large vessel which has been in impound for several months was observed aboard the vessel and cutting the lock on another impounded vessel that does not belong to him. After several contacts with the

owner, the police were called and the owner was arrested on a misdemeanor for taking another's property. After that arrest, we believe the subject was arrested on a felony warrant. He has yet to come to the Harbor Department to retrieve his impounded vessel as he indicated

- A contractor carrying out repairs to the Lido Isle Bridge was transported to a site accessible only by boat over the course of four early mornings commensurate with favorable tides
- A vessel wanting to be assigned to a mooring was inspected but did not pass. A
 list of deficiencies was provided and addressed by the owner/permittee. We
 expect the list to be addressed and the vessel to pass inspection soon

The most amusing call of the month came from an irate waterfront business owner and mooring permittee. He was irate over two items:

- 1) The 48-hour application requirement that one of his customers, a commercial fisherman must meet when he wants to make use of the Rhine Wharf to offload his for-profit catch
- 2) A notice of violation the business owner received related to the condition of the spreader line on his permitted mooring

After listening to the irate business owner use loud, threatening, and profane language, I explained that:

- As a commercial operator, the fisherman was at liberty to make whatever arrangements he wanted at any commercial facility for offloading his catch and ensuring its freshness. If however, that commercial fisherman wanted to continue to use the Rhine Wharf, for free, he is subject to the same requirements and conditions that all other users of that public amenity are and that no special accommodation can be offered to any one user as a matter of fairness to all users. Further, that public amenity is adjacent to waterfront residences. The peaceful enjoyment of those residences guides the intensity and characteristics of the use of the Rhine Wharf
- As a mooring permittee the caller is subject to the same conditions and requirements as every other mooring permittee who chooses to leave the mooring unoccupied with a spreader line. Further, he was not singled out by HSWs. HSWs performing mooring inspections do not reference who the permittee on any particular mooring might be but rather perform their inspections consistently across all permittees, of all skill levels in all fields. When any deficiency is noted a Notice of Violation (NOV) is issued to the permittee using consistent language reviewed and approved by the City Attorney. Lastly, submerged spreader lines constitute a significant hazard to mariners, especially inexperienced mariners operating during low visibility conditions transiting the harbor. Statistics on the assistance we provide for mariners in such unfortunate circumstances were also offered

The complaining business owner was not satisfied with my explanations and went on to accuse me of changing the character of the harbor and driving business (commerce) out of the harbor. He exaggerated the language in the NOV he received and took exception to the exaggerated language.

The specific (NOV) received by the caller is included with this report as Attachment E. The language in this NOV is consistent with all NOVs we issue.

The language on the welcome page of an application to use the Rhine Wharf appears in Attachment F and must be acknowledged by all who apply for permission to use this public amenity.

The Harbormaster seeks feedback from the Commission and the public on whether these arrangements are reasonable, in line with the objectives of the Commission, and support the Harbor Department's "clean, safe and well-enjoyed" mission. Suggestions for improvement to these aspects of the Harbor Department's operations are welcomed. Support for communicating and amplifying these policies and their rationale may be helpful in reducing the anger and abuse directed at department team members and the Harbormaster in particular as we carry out our duties.





Harbor Adjacent Public Amenity Map Usage




Water Quality Monitoring – East Anchorage
