1. Briefly describe below your organization's purpose, mission, and goals.	Overview Founded in 2003 by award-winning

choreographer Jennifer Backhaus, a Newport Beach resident and Chapman University dance faculty member, Backhausdance is Orange County's premier contemporary dance company and a nationally recognized leader in performance, education, and community engagement. Over the past two decades, the company has earned a reputation for artistic excellence, innovative choreography, and meaningful educational programming that connects people of all ages to contemporary dance.

Annually, Backhausdance presents original works in theaters and outdoor venues throughout Orange County and Southern California, including Sherman Library & Gardens in Corona del Mar, while maintaining a strong local presence in Newport Beach schools and community settings. The company is comprised of 12 professional dancers, four artistic and education staff members, a dedicated Board of Directors, and active volunteers. Now celebrating our 23rd season (2025–26), Backhausdance continues to grow artistically and organizationally despite operating without a permanent studio or office.

At the core of Backhausdance's work is a commitment to accessibility, equity, and inclusion, ensuring that contemporary dance is available to diverse communities across generations and lived experiences.

#### Mission, Purpose, and Goals

The mission of Backhausdance is to create, perform, and share innovative contemporary dance that inspires, challenges, and uplifts. We

believe in the transformative power of dance to foster joy, wellness, creative expression, and human connection. Through an integrated...

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... approach that combines professional performance, multi-generational education, and community engagement, Backhausdance cultivates environments where participants and audiences alike are active contributors to the creative process.

Education is central to our mission. Backhausdance is dedicated to introducing students and the community of all ages and abilities to contemporary dance, nurturing creativity, and expanding cultural understanding—particularly for those who may not otherwise have access to professional arts experiences. Our programs empower emerging artists through opportunities such as our annual three-week Summer Intensive, which offers scholarships to teens, university-level students, and professional dancers.

Through long-term partnerships with schools, higher education institutions, local city governments, community organizations, and arts venues, Backhausdance delivers high-quality, impactful arts experiences that strengthen communities and inspire future pathways in the arts. A key organizational goal is to expand contemporary dance education and access within Newport Beach, advancing our belief in “dance every day for every body.”

Access to professional contemporary dance—both performances and in-school training—is extremely limited in Newport Beach. While some schools may host occasional guest

choreographers or single workshops, students rarely have opportunities to participate in multi-week, curriculum-based residencies that provide sequential instruction, creative development, and meaningful professional mentorship during the academic day.

Backhausdance is currently the only professional contemporary dance company offering an in-depth residency of this scope within Newport Beach secondary schools. With support from a generous Cultural Arts Grant from the Newport Beach City Arts Commission, the program is offered at no cost to the schools, removing financial barriers and ensuring equity and inclusiveness. Without this support, students would not otherwise receive this level of sustained engagement with professional artists over a three-month period.

Our proposed program, “Dance Expressions: Creativity and Choreography” provides a distinct and impactful arts experience for Newport Beach students, educators, and the broader community. For most participants, this is the only time they have had to work with a professional contemporary dance company—an experience that promotes physical and emotional well-being, social connection, academic motivation, and sparks curiosity about future study or careers in the arts.

The residency directly engages 130+ middle and high school students through in-school workshops and expands its reach through two professional company assemblies, introducing an additional 650+ students to contemporary dance at the Sea King Theater at Corona del...

... Mar Middle/High School. These performances include discussion of choreography, music, lighting, and production elements, as well as interactive Q&A sessions with the dancers. For most students, this is their 'inaugural' encounter with seeing contemporary dance or a professional dance performance of any kind in a school theater setting or anywhere.

The program culminates in the Fall Choreography Showcase at Corona del Mar Middle/High School, where student-created works are shared with peers, families and community members. With approximately 700 audience members attending, the Showcase offers a powerful opportunity for the community to see the outcomes of the residency,,to experience and celebrate student growth, creativity, the value of sustained arts education, and the ongoing need for expanded dance and cultural enrichment in Newport Beach.

"Dance Expressions" provides a vital physical and creative outlet for teens navigating increasing academic and social pressures, including heightened anxiety and depression. Research, including scientific studies in the field of arts and wellness, reflect the strong coping, recovery and physical and mental health benefits associated with participating in or attending an arts event or creative experience. Additional studies such as "Dance Counts" by the Arts Education Partnership and findings from the National Dance Education Association and American College Dance Association, demonstrate clear links between dance participation and positive psychological, cognitive, and social outcomes, including

creativity, discipline, collaboration, and empathy. These essential skills support student growth, college and...

... career readiness, and the development of a healthy, adaptable workforce and society. Fulfilling this critical need, "Dance Expressions" empowers our next generation.

"Dance Expressions" promotes community involvement and awareness of the arts in Newport Beach by:

- Providing equitable access to professional contemporary dance education during the school day
- Engaging families and residents through public student performances
- Introducing hundreds of students and audience members to contemporary dance as a living art form and potential career pathways

Beyond the schools, Backhausdance has a demonstrated history of enriching the Newport Beach community through accessible contemporary dance programming a free performance at the Newport Beach Civic Center (2017) and Garden Flow (2021, 2023) at Sherman Library and Gardens. Together, these efforts reflect a sustained commitment to serving the community through dance. By addressing a clear gap in arts education and cultural enrichment, "Dance Expressions" enriches the lives of students and residents while serving as a model for expanded programming in Newport Beach schools and community spaces in the future.

school-community based contemporary dance residency in partnership with Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) secondary schools: Corona del Mar Middle/High School (CDM), Back Bay High School (BB), and Newport Harbor High School (NHHS), taking place September–December 2026.

“Dance Expressions” is a multi-week, structured, curriculum-based residency implemented during the academic day, providing sequential instruction, creative development, and direct mentorship with professional dancers. Through contemporary dance workshops, performance and a Fall Choreography Showcase, the program will serve approximately 1,400 Newport Beach students and community members. The program, led by their award-winning local professional contemporary dance company, introduces students to Backhausdance technique, choreography, improvisation, composition, partnering, movement vocabulary, and performance presentation and the joy of dance. Backhausdance instructors, in collaboration with the students, will develop new choreography for the Fall 2026 Student Choreography Showcase performances at CdM for Newport Beach residents and the public, November 19-20, 2026. “Dance Expressions” participants will gain understanding on how to express their creativity, emotions, tell stories and communicate through dance while exploring career pathways into professions in the performing arts.

Held in the Sea King Theatre at CdM on Thursday, October 1, 2026, 9:30am-10:30am and 10:45am- 11:45am, the entire Backhausdance company performs new repertory for Season 26/27 with facilitated discussion by Jennifer...

Backhaus, artistic director, and Amanda Kay White, associate artistic director, to break down the dance movement phrases, production, lighting, costumes and musical elements, with question & answer session between dancers and audience. Invitations are sent to additional CdM, BB and NMUSD high schools with transportation provided by NMUSD. Additional guests include CdM administrators, NMUSD School Board members, Newport Beach Arts Commission and Backhausdance Board (many are Newport Beach residents).

#### 4. Artists, Personnel & Qualifications:

The residency is led by Jennifer Backhaus, founder and artistic director of Backhausdance, with over 25 years of professional and educational leadership. Amanda Kay White, Associate Artistic Director, supports curriculum design, teaching, and performance facilitation.

Workshops are taught by seasoned professional Backhausdance dancers and teaching artists with extensive experience in youth education, community engagement, and contemporary dance performance. Backhausdance company members will perform and engage in dialogue with students and educators after each assembly.

Nancy Warzer-Brady, director of education & community engagement, oversees residency

curriculum, school partnerships, scheduling, and program implementation, working closely with NMUSD educators and administrators to ensure program quality, accessibility, and meaningful community impact.

Existing program

Dance Expressions will serve 750+ students, grades 7 -12, ages 13-18, from CdM, BB, and NHHS and additional students from Newport Beach-based schools, teachers, administrators, as well as 700 audience members from the Newport Beach community attending the Fall Showcase at CdM. Most students have had little to no involvement with a professional dance company or had the opportunity to see a contemporary/modern dance performance in Newport Beach. The experience will engage students' critical thinking abilities and imaginations in a safe environment while they develop new artistic skills to balance their academic and socio-emotional stressors. Backhausdance professional teaching artists are skilled at working with students of all abilities to engage a diverse range of ages, skill levels and backgrounds.

Feedback from students, educators, administrators, and parents will also reflect the overall impact of seeing a greater appreciation for dance as an art form and a possible career pathway.

Teaching artists record daily notes to track progress and make refinements as needed. An artistic and educational team consisting of Jennifer ...

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...Backhaus, Amanda Kay White (associate artistic director), Nancy Warzer-Brady (also a Newport Beach resident), and Chihiro Sano (company dancers and Education Coordinator) collaborate closely with CdM, BB and NHHS educators along with Tamara Fairbanks, NMUSD visual and performing arts coordinator) to plan and ensure the program's success. Nancy Warzer-Brady coordinates the residency, oversees curriculum/content, manages dancers/teaching artists, workshops and performances, promoting and reinforcing strong community engagement and the cultural benefit to the City of Newport Beach.

Dear Applicant:

Based on information you supplied, and assuming your operations will be as stated in your application for recognition of exemption, we have determined you are exempt from federal income tax under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in section 501(c)(3).

Because you are a newly created organization, we are not now making a final determination of your foundation status under section 509(a) of the Code. However, we have determined that you can reasonably expect to be a publicly supported organization described in sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

Accordingly, during an advance ruling period you will be treated as a publicly supported organization, and not as a private foundation. This advance ruling period begins and ends on the dates shown above.

Within 90 days after the end of your advance ruling period, you must send us the information needed to determine whether you have met the requirements of the applicable support test during the advance ruling period. If you establish that you have been a publicly supported organization, we will classify you as a section 509(a)(1) or 509(a)(2) organization as long as you continue to meet the requirements of the applicable support test. If you do not meet the public support requirements during the advance ruling period, we will classify you as a private foundation for future periods. Also, if we classify you as a private foundation, we will treat you as a private foundation from your beginning date for purposes of section 507(d) and 4940.

Grantors and contributors may rely on our determination that you are not a private foundation until 90 days after the end of your advance ruling period. If you send us the required information within the 90 days, grantors and contributors may continue to rely on the advance determination until we make

a final determination of your foundation status.

If we publish a notice in the Internal Revenue Bulletin stating that we will no longer treat you as a publicly supported organization, grantors and contributors may not rely on this determination after the date we publish the notice. In addition, if you lose your status as a publicly supported organization, and a grantor or contributor was responsible for, or was aware of, the act or failure to act, that resulted in your loss of such status, that person may not rely on this determination from the date of the act or failure to act. Also, if a grantor or contributor learned that we had given notice that you would be removed from classification as a publicly supported organization, then that person may not rely on this determination as of the date he or she acquired such knowledge.

However, you are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes. If you have any questions about excise, employment, or other federal taxes, please let us know.

Donors may deduct contributions to you as provided in section 170 of the Internal Revenue Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to you or for your use are deductible for Federal estate and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of sections 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Code.

Donors may deduct contributions to you only to the extent that their contributions are gifts, with no consideration received. Ticket purchases and similar payments in conjunction with fundraising events may not necessarily qualify as deductible contributions, depending on the circumstances. Revenue Ruling 67-246, published in Cumulative Bulletin 1967-2, on page 104, gives guidelines regarding when taxpayers may deduct payments for admission to, or other participation in, fundraising activities for charity.

You are not required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax, if your gross receipts each year are normally \$25,000 or less. If you receive a Form 990 package in the mail, simply attach the label provided, check the box in the heading to indicate that your annual gross receipts are normally \$25,000 or less, and sign the return. Because you will be treated as a public charity for return filing purposes during your entire advance ruling period, you should file Form 990 for each year in your advance ruling period.

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that you exceed the \$25,000 filing threshold even if your sources of support do not satisfy the public support test specified in the heading of this letter.

If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of your annual accounting period. A penalty of \$20 a day is charged when a return is filed late, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay. However, the maximum penalty charged cannot exceed \$10,000 or 5 percent of your gross receipts for the year, whichever is less. For organizations with gross receipts exceeding \$1,000,000 in any year, the penalty is \$100 per day per return, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay. The maximum penalty for an organization with gross receipts exceeding \$1,000,000 shall not exceed \$50,000. This penalty may also be charged if a return is not complete. So, please be sure your return is complete before you file it.

You are not required to file federal income tax returns unless you are subject to the tax on unrelated business income under section 511 of the Code. If you are subject to this tax, you must file an income tax return on Form 990-T, Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return. In this letter we are not determining whether any of your present or proposed activities are unrelated trade or business as defined in section 513 of the Code.

You are required to make your annual information return, Form 990 or Form 990-EZ, available for public inspection for three years after the later of the due date of the return or the date the return is filed. You are also required to make available for public inspection your exemption application, any supporting documents, and your exemption letter. Copies of these documents are also required to be provided to any individual upon written or in person request without charge other than reasonable fees for copying and postage. You may fulfill this requirement by placing these documents on the Internet. Penalties may be imposed for failure to comply with these requirements. Additional information is available in Publication 557, Tax-Exempt Status for Your Organization, or you may call our toll free number shown above.

You need an employer identification number even if you have no employees. If an employer identification number was not entered on your application, we will assign a number to you and advise you of it. Please use that number on all returns you file and in all correspondence with the Internal Revenue Service.




